HANDS AT WORK IN AFRICA

CHINKU COMMUNITY

MALAWI

The community of Chinku has a large population, with many people coming to Malawi from Mozambique because of the civil war. The majority of people living in Chinku are subsistence farmers who live well below the poverty line and struggle to provide for their families. Some of the additional challenges in Chinku are HIV/ AIDS and a lack of access to clean water and medical care.

When Erick, a teacher and pastor in Chinku Community, realised the desperate need to care for the most vulnerable children, he, together with a group of newly mobilised Care Workers, partnered with Hands at Work to form the Chisangalalo Community Based Organisation (CBO). Today, there are 15 dedicated Care Workers who are committed to knowing 130 of the most vulnerable children by name and understanding their physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

Chinku is one of many communities in Malawi facing challenges due to several years of drought and poor harvests. In 2016, when the drought in Malawi was at its peak, Hands at Work implemented a food relief programme to ease the impact of the drought. Once-off provisions of essentials like maizemeal, oil and salt were given to the families of children who attend the Care Point in addition to the Care Workers and their families. A surprising but encouraging outcome of this was how the community embraced the work of Hands at Work and the local Care Workers in a new way, wholeheartedly welcoming the Care Workers and visiting teams into their homes. This gave the Care Workers great opportunities to share God's lifegiving love throughout the community!

Although Pastor Erick's church is in disrepair, he willingly uses the building as a Care Point for the children. This is a beautiful outworking of the Hands at Work vision to join with the local church in caring for children. In 2022, Pastor Erick's health declined, requiring him to move back to his rural home. Sadly, the current leaders at his church struggled to understand the vision of Hands at Work and have

been pushing for the Chisangalalo CBO to find their own land to operate from. Thankfully Harold took over the leadership of the Chisangalalo CBO.
