TAKING A STAND

"When we talk of fighting for the lost one, this is what it means. Throughout the lockdown, we have seen courageous men and woman standing up for our children. Sometimes we need to be radical when it comes to fighting for our children, we need to take a stand."

Across Africa, Hands at Work has seen a sharp increase in childhood marriage due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as families are desperate to have some sense of financial security. Zimbabwe is no exception.

When Farai and the Honde Valley Service Centre heard that Ruth, a young girl from Pimai C Community had been forced into an early marriage by her mother, they sprang into action.

Understanding that early marriage is deeply rooted in the culture, they knew that they would face opposition in their fight to bring Ruth home.

The team faced many difficult conversations with Ruth's family who initially tried to mislead them and keep Ruth in the marriage. After a day of searching, questioning and pleading for Ruth's whereabouts, the family, realising that Farai and the team weren't going to give up, brought Ruth to her school where Farai and the team could meet with them all.

Ruth is no longer in the marriage, but her journey to healing has only just begun. The trauma that she has endured will likely have a longlasting impact on her life, but Farai and her Care Workers are dedicated to helping her find healing and access to the services needed to do so.

They are also committed to walking with her mother, helping her to understand the dangers of early marriage, and the benefits of consistent Christ-centred care. This is what it means to take a stand, and fight for the lost one.

What does it mean to encourage one another and stand with our brothers and sisters in prayer?

Angel shares, "The watchword for 2021 reminds us that we shouldn't live in fear, no matter what happens. Even our travel from the Congo to Zambia, was filled with challenges. Thankfully, God allowed our COVID results to be negative and so we were able to travel to the border. Just near the border, we found that there was some fighting happening, where people were burning tyres and throwing stones, while the road was blocked. We tried going different ways, but people kept trying to throw things at the car. We continued going at our own risk, until one motorbike driver saw us and asked where we were going. He then told us to follow him. That guy on the motorbike was our angel. We don't know where he came from, but we knew that God had sent him. He was driving fast and the way we went, I couldn't tell you where we were driving. After a long way, we reached the border and we were able to cross. It was a miracle from God.

As we were facing those challenges, Erick was in communication with team in Zambia. We kept receiving messages of encouragement and prayer. As we were facing challenges, those messages kept bringing strength. We felt like we weren't alone. From those prayers, God really revealed himself to us. That's why we need to encourage each other in any challenges we are facing. They are important. No matter what the barriers or obstacles are, we need to push because this is the calling that we have received from God."

Erick adds, "Even in the midst of the stones being thrown, I felt God saying 'just go'. I don't understand how the stones didn't damage our car. The question I can ask is, who are you encouraging? When we encourage someone, we don't know the impact that it will have."
